Living Labs are open innovation networks developed in collaboration with local actors, aiming to co-develop and co-test novel solutions that meet real-life needs. The establishment and implementation of Living Labs are associated with several advantages, in and beyond rural areas. These range from engaging local actors to developing new ideas and piloting solutions, promoting stakeholder ownership and uptake of such solutions.

Across Europe, several European projects have recognised the added value of Living Labs for carrying out action research and testing novel solutions. Among these, the Horizon Europe project <u>GRANULAR</u> has established <u>7 Living</u> <u>Labs and 9 Replication Labs</u> in various rural areas of Europe with the objective of jointly defining data collection techniques and indicators to enhance rural policies at the local level.

In this webinar, different <u>fascinating rural Living Labs</u> from GRANULAR and other European projects will be featured. You'll hear about real-life successes and difficulties. Invited speakers will share their lessons learnt from different Living Labs at various stages of development, including early, mature, and growth.
